





Your eyes will naturally rest on these lines or grids, not on the center of a photo.

Then the Titans led their four-game lead in the AFC South - and NFL-best 10th consecutive regular-season win with a 66-yard march that ended with LenDale White's 10th touchdown run of the season.

Tennessee had come back from a 14-6 deficit to tie late in the third on an 80-yard drive when White ran 1 yard for the first of his two TD runs. The Titans onverted the tying two-pointer when Collins found fullback Ahmard Hall wide open.

Tennessee added a final TD on rookie Chris John son's 16-yard run right after the second of Peyton Manning's two interceptions, both by Chris Hope, "We're not a secret anymore," Hope said.

The Colts got a TD with 1:17 left on a Manning seeper but fell to 3-4 and saw their seven-game Monday night winning streak end. Their five-year omination of the AFC South also is in jeopardy. "I hink we made a statement in our division," Ten rssee linebacker Keith Bulluck said. "Right now the Titans are the team to beat in the AFC South."
